Mews Flash..... Trapping Update



You know that saying, "time flies when you're having fun?" Well, we can say the same is true when you're saving cats – it's been far too long since our last newsletter!

There's so many great things going on at the Meow Mission and we can't wait to share them with you. First up, we'd like to tell you what's so great about the number 300.

Back in 2011, when we first started helping cats, we didn't trap – we spread the word about TNR and helped folks pay for the spay/neuter surgeries at ABC Clinic. We held events and sent out appeals for donations and with your help, we were able to fix 92 cats. Over that time, we received many pleas for help trapping. Many of the folks we help aren't able to trap themselves or, are able but don't have the equipment. With that in mind, we decided we needed to do more to help Michiana's cats – and we did.

With generous support from our community, we were able to purchase 12 TNR specific traps. Now we were prepared to loan traps to those who were able to trap their own colonies but we still needed to get trained to do the trapping ourselves. Some of us have experience trapping our own colonies and the rest of us set out to learn from the experts – our friends at Elkhart County Feral Cat Coalition

(elkhartferalcats.org).







Trapping Update Continued

We tagged along and helped on trappings, and asked lots and lots of questions and received tons of great advice from this group of hard working, dedicated TNR advocates. We did lots of research and watched videos but nothing was as helpful as the years of experience ECFCC has—and we are very thankful for their help—and continued advice as we forge through the TNR waters.

We also joined Alley Cat Allies (alleycat.org) Feral Friends Network—now we're able to join a nationwide community of folks like us—people who loves these animals and are willing to fight for their right to life.

For our first trapping, we set out for 11 cats. Their caretaker was great in preparing the cats for us ahead of time – we brought out the traps a week prior and took the door off, just as we'd learned from ECFCC. . The caretaker then started feeding the cats in the traps—this is an essential preparation so the cats are not afraid to go into the traps. We asked her to withhold food the day prior (we only do this with adults—never kittens) so they'd be really hungry when we arrived to trap.

Our first trapping last summer was very successful—we brought a few extra traps as ECFCC advised us, 'just in case' and boy are we glad we did. Instead of the 11 cats we'd expected, we ended up with 13! Turns out that three of the cats looked so much alike, the caretaker thought they were the same cat! We continued learning and trapping and before we knew it, the year was over. Remember how we told you that we fixed 92 cats? By the end of 2013 we helped spay and neuter <u>300 cats</u>. Requests for help keep coming in so we expect to do even more in 2014!



Come see us at ABC's Spay 5K—we'll be selling our handmade and stuffed with love pet beds and one of a kind cat toys. All proceeds go to spay/ neuter Michiana's free-roaming cats.





Have You Heard?

TNR is one step closer in South Bend to becoming the preferred method over animal control's current catch and kill methodology.

The South Bend Common Council is considering replacing the current animal law, Chapter 5 of the Municipal Code. The new proposal balances the humane care of animals with public safety and property rights protecting both the two-legged and four-legged resi-

dents of the City. The proposed law focuses on responsible pet ownership through spaying/neutering animals, adding clear universal leash laws, eliminating breed discriminatory language, tethering restrictions, and trap neuter return (TNR).

Under the current law, free-roaming outdoor cats are considered owned after they are fed just a handful of times. Proving ownership under the current law is problematic and places licensing requirements and pet limit restrictions on colony care takers. Under the current law, a free-roaming cat is always considered atlarge. When the South Bend Animal Care and Control picks up an at-large free-roaming cat they believe is feral, that animal is often euthanized immediately. We believe this practice is inhumane and an ineffective use of taxpayer dollars.

For the past year, a special committee led by Councilwoman Valerie Schey, has drafted a replacement for Chapter 5. The proposed language was modeled after Fort Wayne's animal control laws. Under the new provisions, the term feral cat is eliminated and replaced with free-roaming cats (pre-spay/neuter) or community cats (post spay/neuter). Free-roaming and community cats are no longer considered owned and are not at large. TNR is encouraged because altered community cats are healthier, less likely to roam, less likely to fight, and less likely to spray than unaltered cats. They are easily identifiable by their ear tip. TNR is the only humane way to control the community cat population. SBACC will work with colony caretakers and organizations like The Meow Mission to ensure free-roaming cats and community cats are not picked-up by animal control officers. This can save both lives and taxpayer resources.


Additionally, the State Legislature is also considering making changes regarding feral cats. Current state law prohibits domestic animals or house pets from running at large or creating a public nuisance within a mobile home community. New language has been proposed to amend this law to exclude feral cats.




